The aim of the sessions are to;

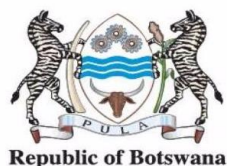

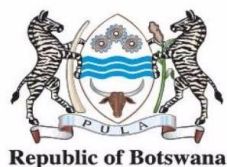

The importance of rural communities dependent upon the natural resources for livestock, food production, cash crop cultivation, firewood, organic fruit, wild herbs and game meat for survival, were highlighted in the Situational Analysis Report (SAR). 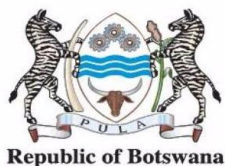

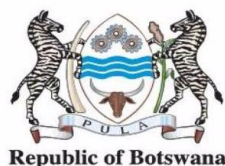

However the lack of sustainable funding for the establishment, development and management activities remains a critical challenge for TFCAs. Member States and International Cooperating Partners are key funders of programmes in TFCA landscapes. A variety of innovative financial mechanisms are emerging that are particularly relevant in the context of integrated landscape and seascape management approaches, which is in essence what TFCAs are.
